Essay Contest Details:

- Every essay should start with "I am proud to be an American..." From that point, it is up to the student to express their reasons, thoughts, and ideas.
- Essays should be between 250 to 500 words or up to 3 pages.
- The essay should be submitted as an attachment and sent to Rose Slike at rslike@clarionfreelibrary.org. All documents should include the student's first and last name, their school, grade, and guardian contact information.
- 3 judges will review the essays and select the winners.
- One winner will be selected from Grades 3-6, Grades 7-9, and Grades 10-12 equaling a total of 3 winners. Runner ups will also be selected for each age group.
- The winners will have their pieces published by the Clarion News.
- Prizes remain to be determined.
